From the Rabbi's Desk

Rabbi Jaimee Shalhevet



Dear North Shore Synagogue Family,

While the world outside sometimes looks bleak, I find the light of hope in North Shore Synagogue. There are so many good things happening here. From activities to do with family or friends, to community service programs helping those in need, to enriching your own learning and spirituality.

A few enjoyable family moments include our Family Bingo night and our Family bowling outing. It was so much fun to bowl and play video games (and air hockey!) with our students and their families! I saw some great bowling, some really amazing skills at the basketball arcade area and siblings getting along to see how many tickets they could acquire together or if they could combine their bowling scores to beat those of their parents.

Our community has now come together three times to volunteer to make meals at the Ronald McDonald house outside of Cohen's Children's hospital attached to LIJ. Speaking from personal experience, I can tell you first hand how meaningful a home cooked meal is to parents staying at the Ronald McDonald house while caring for their child in the hospital. The gift which our community gave to those families is immeasurable. We continued through the month of March with the Mitzvah of feeding those with food insecurity by collecting canned and dried goods to stock the shelves at the Sid Jacobson JCC's food pantry. North Shore Synagogue yearns to fulfill these mitzvot as often as possible and I couldn't be prouder to call NSS my home.

Also, it is with great joy that I announce that this High Holy Day Season, we will be rolling out a new Machzor (High Holy Day Prayerbook) for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. This prayerbook, made to look like our Shabbat Prayerbook, Mishkan T'fillah, is called Mishkan Hanefesh, the temple of the soul.

The most beautiful thing about Reform Judaism to me is that our very name is a verb. To us change is not "inevitable," it is "excitingly anticipated." And what an exciting change this is.

Our new Machzor has every prayer in both Hebrew and transliteration (Hebrew words written out in English letters) allowing everyone, regardless of Hebrew knowledge, to fully participate in our prayers. The English readings in addition to translations offers many new interpretations so that each and every one of you can find your voice in our service. The screens we have used these past few years have already familiarized us with the format of this new prayerbook, but there's so much more to discover!

As we get closer to the High Holy Days, I will share more and more treasures in our new prayerbook. You can experience them in person at classes I will hold or via recordings that will be available on our website. I am so excited for this new step in our High Holy Day services!

Why Do We Sing?

Have you ever walked into a Synagogue or Church to attend a regular weekday or weekend service and the prayers were mumbled quickly in quiet tones, the sermons delivered quietly, the responses barely heard? It would be as if something were missing,

something important. Imagine for a moment that you go to a Broadway Musical and instead of an orchestra, instead of the performers singing, they only quietly say the lines, without rhythm or rhyme, and I am not talking about rap as in Hamilton, but just spoken. It would feel like something was missing. Or you go to a movie, let's say one of the Marvel Movies. You get yourself set for an entertainment experience and the movie begins quietly, without introduction music, and each scene is spoken quietly with no background music. Again, something would be missing, something important.

Music is important to us physiologically as well as an important part of communication. As a Cantor I focus on the music, not just the *T'fillot* we pray. It is important that the music chosen can help to interpret the words and emphasize the theme of a specific prayer. I can utilize my voice, a guitar, a band in the background, a choir, etc. The music helps to make the service spiritual, bringing the community together as One Voice.

"Singing is proven to release endorphins and oxytocin, which is known to stimulate feelings of trust and bonding while eliminating anxiety and depression. Singers have been observed to have lower levels of cortisol, indicating reduced stress levels." As I was studying to become a Cantor I had the privilege of attending services in various synagogues, churches and mosques. In each case it was the music that would lift the congregation to a joyous chorus. The sung prayers felt more powerful, more intense than if they had been recited individually. You can feel the energy of a communal prayer when every voice is raised in song and you just know your prayer is being heard.

Singing together helps us to strengthen our community and interpersonal connections. One way we can see this develop is in a choir. For example, you can see the difference when members of a choral group rehearse separately, and then when they come together to work as a group. They attain a sense of purpose that is larger than a single individual. Each different voice type is blended together. Our ancestors recognized the power of rhythm and music and we have been creating musical motifs for our prayers ever since. This not only makes them easier to learn but it also has the added benefit of making us feel better when we sing them. Even if people gather together only one time a year for a service like Passover or the High Holy Days our voices join together in that musical celebration of community.

There are documented health benefits to singing. There was a study published in "Frontiers in Psychology" by researchers from the Centre for Performing Science, Royal College of Music, London, UK: "...reveals that singing brings stress relief by reducing cortisol levels (the stress hormone.) Singing is great for our immune systems as it increases our levels of immunoglobulin A, and antibody blood protein essential for immunity. These levels are much higher when we sing as opposed to listen to music...." (source: <https://medium.com/@thekisshouse/the-power-of-singing-7e66207f7e4>).

One of my favorite rebuffs when I ask Congregants to sing with me is "you do not want to hear my voice", or "I'm tone deaf – I can't sing". If you enjoy listening to music then you are not tone deaf. The technical name for this condition is called Amusia and it affects approximately 4 per cent of the population. Those with the condition are unable to process and replicate musical sounds. Therefore, if you derive pleasure from listening to music you are definitely capable of singing.

Singing is something we can all participate in, not just for the shower, but along with each other at a service. So the next time I ask you to sing along with me, relax, open your mouth and allow yourself to become immersed in the song, all the while feeling your levels of cortisol go down and your endorphins rise up!

Have a wonderful Pesach, Shavuot, and start to your summer.

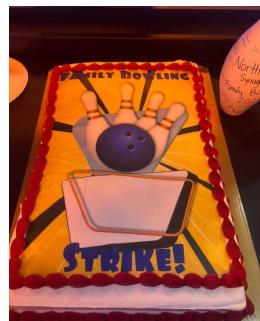
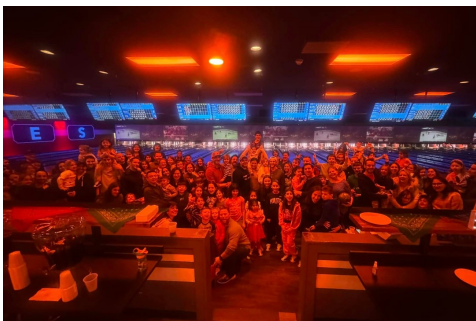
Cantor Hevenstone's Installation
