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

HOW TO REACH US

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From the Rabbi's Desk Rabbi Jaimee Shalhevet



Do you remember the joy of summer break as a kid? The days were so long they lasted until evening. Lightning bugs lit up the night sky. And time just seemed to pass slower and more calmly. Some of us took family vacations. Some of us stayed home and took day trips to the local pool or playground. Some of us went to day camp or sleepaway camp. Being that I was blessed to have parents who were public

school teachers, I did all of these activities during my childhood summers. Different summers had us doing different things. While I have amazing memories of all of these, my absolute favorite was sleepaway summer camp.

They call camp "the bubble." And it's for a very good reason. Inside camp is a different world. One where most people don't wear watches, nobody carries a phone, and we all simply move in the communal wave of time. Somehow, almost magically, there is huge growth in individualism as well. There are personal choices to be had, decisions to be made, and individual experiences too.

In this way, camp creates a communal space that is both individually nurturing and beautiful community building. It creates a safe haven from so many outside forces - the news, school, work, or social judgementalism, societal pressures, and so much more. Being at camp feels like a weight lifted off of your shoulders. It feels like a warm, safe, hug on a cold winter's night. It feels, well, like a bubble.

What makes this bubble possible?

I'm going to focus on Jewish Summer camps for the most part, but in reality, even those non-religious summer camps were often built on the Jewish values of early summer camps. Sleep away summer camping became a "Jewish" thing around the turn of the century (1893-1902 ish) because of antisemitism and overcrowded conditions in tenement housing on the Lower East Side. Jews were being turned away from many vacationing opportunities as well as being crowded into areas that were ripe with Polio and other diseases. The first two New York Jewish Summer camps, Camp Lehman and Surprise Lake Camp, were charity camps sponsored by Jewish organizations for lower income Jewish families and children. They held the purpose of both protecting our jewish children from Polio and shielding them from antisemitism, with the added goal of helping them to assimilate into American society by teaching baseball and introducing them to "American" foods.

Nowadays, a Jewish summer camp still shields our children from antisemitism sadly. Where else can our Jewish children go and we can be sure that they will not see a swastika in a bathroom stall?

Where else can they belt out Oseh Shalom without anyone screaming that Israel is an apartheid, colonialist state? It's so so sad, but it's true.

Our summer camps, contrary to their original purpose, do not attempt to assimilate our children into American culture, but rather, changing with the time, they are safe spaces for them to explore their Judaism. They can grapple with their own concept of God and know that they will not be judged. They can enjoy Shabbat in their own way and feel fully refreshed for the week to come.

Our camps do this because they make a conscious effort to do so.

So, the important question for those of us who cannot spend our entire summers at camp is, how do we make this bubble for ourselves this summer?

And the answer is, we must make a conscious effort to do so.

We must seek out people with whom we are comfortable and know will not judge us and we must carefully not judge anyone else. We must make space for each other. We must take stock of what is really important and put our phones away in favor of face to face communication and connection.

While the school year will be over, our synagogue does not close its doors during the summer. God does not take summer vacation. If you need a place to experience the joy of Shabbat, we are here. If you need a place to know that there is no judgment. We are here. If you need a place to get away and recharge. We are here. So please, when you need a bubble, know that you have Camp North Shore Synagogue here to embrace you.

Cantor's Notes Cantor Steven Hevenstone



From May 18th through the 24th I had the pleasure of attending the Cantors Assembly Conference in Galloway, NJ at the Seaview Hotel and Resorts. It is always a great opportunity for me to be among my colleagues and friends making music together, joining and learning together in sessions. I can only describe it as an overall feeling of joy when 150 plus cantors join together in song, singing

melodies old and new together. You know that feeling. You turn on your favorite station or song list, (mine is Jewish Rock Radio, an online Jewish Music station run by Rick Recht) Maybe it's a Billy Joel song, maybe Queen, or Hercules Smith, and suddenly you are transported to the past and a beautiful memory as if it happened yesterday. Music has the ability to create and form memories and the power to bring that memory into focus. "Music has a prominent role in the everyday life of many people. Whether it is for recreation, distraction or mood enhancement, a lot of people listen to music from early in the morning until late at night, especially since the invention of radio and recordings. Because of its near ubiquity, music has been identified as important in the construction of autobiographical memories and thus for making judgements about oneself and others." (Source: National Institute of Health)

For many of us that is what happens when we come to the Synagogue and hear a chanted prayer, or sing along with a congregational melody. The prayers and their melody may transport us to another time when we were sitting in Shul. You can walk into any Synagogue in the world, even Israel, and you will hear a familiar melody and can participate in the service and feel comfortable when you are there.

Jewish prayer has always been associated with music. We learn our Hebrew letters through song. Today you can probably recognize Debbie Friedman's (z"l) melody used to teach the Alef, Bet, and prior to that there were other melodies utilized to teach the Hebrew letters. It is also the same for those of us who are Hazzanim. I know that when I sing a traditional melody I am transported back to my Synagogue, Rodeph Shalom in Bridgeport, CT and to be able to listen to my Cantor, Y'Shaya Grama (z"l) sing the prayers again would be a gift. There are many times I am singing on the Bima

and I hear his voice in my head, and feel his presence, as if I could turn around and he would be there next to me singing the prayers along with me in his powerful dramatic, operatic tenor voice. Those melodies that many of us hold on to are what bring us a sense of comfort. They bring us those warm memories of going to synagogue with our parents, our grandparents, our friends.

A great example of this strong sense of memory in the Synagogue is during the Kol Nidre. Everyone knows the melody. "The melody that stirs the heart of Ashkenazic Jews is of unknown origin, but is part of a body of music known as "MiSinai melodies" that emerged in Germany between the 11th and 15th centuries. "MiSinai" literally means 'from Sinai." Of course, we know that none of these tunes came from anywhere in the Middle East, but the hold they have had on Ashkenazic Jews has made them as venerated as if the "came down from the mountain." (Source: Sounds of Kol Nidre).

As we look at the memories our music evokes, where does this leave room for new melodies? If we are open to musical possibilities, new music can create new memories and help us to potentially look at a prayer in a completely different way. What are your earliest musical memories? Or, if you're of a certain age, remember back 50 years ago to the melodies that began right here at North Shore. How have they changed? How are they the same? I'd love to have a discussion about it.

We should all look forward to listening to the music of the next 50 years and beyond. May our songs continue to blossom and grow, may our harmonies always be sweet, and may we continue to be together. L'Dor Vador – Generation to Generation, as our music continues to make beautiful understanding and memories together as a community.




